### Words

root word	A root word is a basic word with no prefix or suffix added to it.
prefix/ suffix	A prefix is a string of letters added to the start of a word: im + possible. Suffixes go at the end: usual +ly
word family	This is a group of words that share the same <u>root word</u> to which different prefixes and suffixes are added: <u>divide</u> , <u>dividing</u> , <u>division</u> , <u>undivided</u> , <u>divisible</u>
vowel	The letters <b>a e i o u</b> are vowels.  Use the word <b>an</b> before nouns that begin with a vowel: <u>an</u> elephant, <u>an</u> apple
consonant	The letters of the alphabet that are not vowels. Use the word a before nouns that begin with consonants: <u>a</u> dolphin, <u>a</u> shark
conjunction	A conjunction is a joining word that links different parts of sentences.  when because and although
preposition	These usually describe the position of something: under, beside, next to
adverb	An adverb can tell you when or how something is done.  angrily, gently, yesterday, early, often, eventually

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main clause	A main clause is a group of words that contains a verb (doing/action word) and a subject which makes complete sense on its own. The subject of a sentence is the person or thing doing the action or being described.  Fred ate all the biscuits. He is very greedy.	
subordinate clauses	A subordinate clause has a subject and a verb, but it cannot stand alone as a complete sentence. It adds more detail to the main clause and usually starts with a <b>conjunction</b> .	
	Daisy went to bed <u>because</u> she was tired. <u>When I was doing my homework</u> , my brother played football in the garden.

#### Direct speech and inverted commas

Speech marks (or inverted commas) are used to separate spoken words from the rest of a story. Start with a capital letter.
